

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




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Dear Student,

Career planning is an evolving exercise that takes time to 'cycle' through many stages of exploration. Students beginning in Year 9 have embarked upon their first formal 'Careers' session during their Leadership Program and have been introduced the below model of career planning.



The first stage involves 'Knowing yourself' which includes finding out what skills you have, what interest you have and what values you highly regard. 'Knowing yourself' allows you to reflect on your likes and dislikes and helps you identify any 'gaps' in what type of skills or subjects you need before committing towards a career direction.

The second stage includes exploring all possibilities, and gaining knowledge about different future education requirements, occupations and industry areas. Information gathering can take many forms and one effective way to gain this type of information is to attend many of the free tertiary 'experience' and information and activities sessions running over the Term One break.

Free Term One events are listed throughout this newsletter, so please read through the information carefully.

The third stage involves 'Making Decisions'. In the Senior School years, this is normally denoted by subject choices and part-time job commitments. Gaining much popularity, is student involvement in community volunteerism. Volunteerism has been a great attribute of a high proportion of our student-base and is highly encouraged to help support future decision making as well as develop necessary employability and leadership skills.

The last stage sees students act on their informed decisions by further enriching their career aspirations. For some, it may see them re-direct their career goals to another industry area or field dependent on their exploration findings. This cycle is believed to continue throughout one's life, but students at BMG are encouraged to develop skills to cope with change.

News from the Science Faculty

Monash Science recognises the importance of *industry based experience* and knowledge to prepare students for their future careers. Students can complete an industry project, or build their employability skills with career focused units including:

- ✓ **Science Schools Project** students are placed in teams in a school environment where they teach science to school students. This immersive experience develops highly transferable skills including communication, project and time management and team- work. Students may use this opportunity to get a taste for teaching as a possible career.
- ✓ **Science Industry Placement Unit** this credit unit enables students to undertake a science-based industry placement of at least 80hrs. Students have the opportunity to put into practice the knowledge and skills developed in their course.
- ✓ Career Skills for Scientists this unit uses work-related activities to enhance transferable skills including commercial awareness, leadership, teamwork and communication. Through scenarios and creative problem solving activities, students learn about the business environment. Students will also gain training in writing a CV and job applications.

Global Immersion Guarantee

The *Monash Arts Global Immersion Guarantee (GIG)* is a ground-breaking *new* initiative – a guaranteed two-week overseas study experience for all first year **Bachelor of Arts** and **Bachelor of Global Studies** students who have successfully completed one semester of their Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Global Studies single or double degree and are in good academic standing. The cost of airfares, accommodation and local travel will be covered as part of the program.

Students will study the impact of the global movement of people and goods on environmental sustainability; in either Prato (Italy), Monash Malaysia, or Indonesia, and students will earn credit for two units towards their degree.

New in 2019: Bachelor of Criminology

In the new **Bachelor of Criminology**, students will develop specialist knowledge of specific criminal concerns, including hate crime, serious and violent crime, cybercrime, and transnational and organised crime.

Students will also have opportunities to travel internationally to meet criminal justice experts across Asia, Europe and the Americas; to undertake field trips; and to participate in internships. Along the way, students will:

- ✓ Be challenged to apply abstract knowledge to real-world problems of crime and justice, and develop solutions.
- ✓ Consider the local, national and global aspects of crime and justice, and become familiar with a range of lenses for considering and assessing the efficiency and impact of society's changing understandings and responses.
- ✓ Gain an in-depth knowledge of victimisation and perpetration, as well as inequality and how it impacts approaches to understanding crime and difference.
- ✓ Learn about the types of crime committed by individuals, groups, organisations and states, and the mechanisms of the criminal justice system including police, courts and corrections.

Career prospects are broad and could include roles in government organisations such as the Police Force or court systems, the Office of Corrections, the Department of Justice or the Attorney-General's Department. Graduates with criminology specialist understanding are also sought after in anti-corruption organisations, community legal centres, human rights organisations, criminal justice centres, or private organisations responding to issues of crime.

New Majors in the Bachelor of Business

Two new majors being offered within the <u>Bachelor of Business</u> are –

Accounting and Financial Planning – this major invites student to dive into finance on large- and small-scale arenas – preparing them for a varied career in the economics industry. Students will cover a range of study areas, including both commercial and personal accounting, along with the theoretical components of business, finance, and commerce law. Most importantly, the Accounting and Financial Planning major meets the educational requirements of the Financial Planning Association of Australia (FPA), as well as being accredited by Chartered Accountants Australia and New Zealand (CAANZ), and CPA Australia.

<u>Financial Planning</u> – this major allows students to learn in-depth skills in financial planning – giving them the knowledge to help others through economics. Students will cover a range of finance topics that everyday citizens need help with – including financial management, taxation, ethics, retirement planning, investments, and even financial risk.

The Financial Planning major meets the educational requirements of the Financial Planning Association of Australia (FPA), ensuring students learn the skills needed to enter the financial planning industry with confidence.

Bachelor of Nutrition Science at Deakin

The **Bachelor of Nutrition Science** offers a *new* major sequence - <u>Food Innovation</u> — which focuses on the innovative design of healthy foods to meet consumer wants which provides key knowledge and skills for employment as a food scientist in the food industry. Students may gain employment in food regulation, food safety and Quality, food product development and sensory analysis. The Bachelor of Nutrition Science course can be used as a pathway into the <u>Master of Dietetics</u>.

The **VCE prerequisites** are Units 3 and 4: a study score of at least 30 in English (EAL) or at least 25 in English other than EAL.

Subject bonuses: A study score of 35 in Biology, any English, Food and Technology or Health and Human Development equals 3 aggregate points per study. A study score of 30 in Chemistry, Maths: Mathematical Methods (any) or Maths: Specialist Mathematics equals 3 aggregate points per study. A study score of 30 in Biology, any English, Food and Technology or Health and Human Development equals 2 aggregate points per study. A study score of 20 in Chemistry, Maths: Mathematical Methods (any) or Maths: Specialist Mathematics equals 2 aggregate points per study. Nutritionists and Dietitians

According to the Dietitian Association of Australia (DAA) - Dietitian Association of Australia (DAA), there is a distinction made between dietitians and other occupations in the nutrition and food science field, including that of nutritionist. The key difference between a dietitian and a nutritionist is that, in addition to or as part of their qualification in human nutrition, a dietitian has undertaken a course of study that included substantial theory and supervised and assessed professional practice in clinical nutrition, medical nutrition therapy and food service management. So, in Australia, all dietitians are nutritionists however nutritionists without a dietetics qualification cannot take on the expert role of a dietitian.

Careers in Marine Science

The <u>Good Universities Guide - Marine Scientist</u> states that a marine scientist uses principles and techniques of natural sciences, mathematics and engineering to study the coastal zone and oceans: their movements, physical properties and biological organisms.

Marine scientists assist in developing practical methods for weather forecasting, environmental assessment, locating and developing fishing and mining resources, and improving national defence. They may develop new technologies to protect the seas from pollution and the coasts from damage by waves and tides.

Marine scientists make use of special instruments, satellites, cameras, sounding devices and research vessels when undertaking ocean exploration work. They may also make underwater dives.

Marine Scientists also collaborate with <u>Good Universities - Marine Biologists</u>, <u>Good Universities - Marine Engineers</u>, and <u>Good Universities - Fisheries Officers</u>

Awardees received a total of \$10,000 (domestic students) and \$15,000 (international students). Open to all undergraduate degrees excluding the Bond Medical Program.

Excellence Scholarships

Awarded to Year 12 students with an anticipated ATAR of over 91.00, demonstrating exceptional potential, strong leadership skills and extensive involvement in extra-curricular activities. The value of the scholarships is 50% of tuition fees for any single or combined degree (Bond Medical Program).

Indigenous Scholarships

These scholarships, valued up to 50% of tuition fees for any single undergraduate degree (excluding the Bond Medical Program) or 100% tuition for any diploma program, are awarded to Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander students who have demonstrated extracurricular involvement, leadership potential and academic achievements.

ADCO Sports Excellence Scholarship

The ADCO Sports Excellence Scholarship celebrates this by awarding sporting scholarships to outstanding sports men and women from around Australia with the chance to help fund their tertiary studies. Valued at 50% of the cost of any single undergraduate degree or single postgraduate degree (excludes the Bond Medical Program, Doctor of Physiotherapy, Master of Psychology; Clinical and Forensic and Master of Creative Arts), as well as a \$10,000 cash bursary will be awarded per year of study for a maximum of 2 years.

Note: Year 12 students are able to apply for any of these scholarships until the closing date. Scholarship applications should be submitted <u>online</u> and applications open soon. Students should note that only one applications needs to be made, and students can apply for as many scholarships they are eligible for.

After attending an information session run by EducationUSA and The National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) the on 14 March, I have decided to create a Careers Moodle page which showcases the most relevant information you need to know if you are planning on making an application to a US College.

Please note that it is highly recommended that if you intend on lodging an application to study in the US in your final Year 12 year than plenty of pre-planning and preparation will best assist your application.



The application system involves ensuring that the correct mix of studies are taken from Year 9 and onwards. This information is also useful for students in Years 7 & 8 who are planning ahead.

Core course requirements

To be eligible to play in Division I, the NCAA requires the completion of 16 core courses in Years 9-12:

- 4 years of English
- 3 years of maths
- 2 years of natural or physical science (including one year of lab science if offered by your school) (e.g. general science in years 9-10, chemistry, physics, biology in years 11-12)
- · 1 extra year of English, maths or natural or physical science
- 2 years of social science (e.g. history, geography, economics, international relations, psychology)
- 4 years of extra core courses (from any category above, or foreign language, comparative religion or philosophy)

Australian subjects not recognized as NCAA core courses:

Information technology, physical education, health and human movement, business studies, accounting, graphics, performing/visual arts/drama/music, technology, English as a second language (ESL) and VET courses.
