This week, the Maddingley Year 1s and Year 4s had their first opportunity in 2023 to explore and participate in outdoor learning activities at Staughton Vale.

The weather was perfect and students were excited to go and explore the magnificent Staughton Vale property.

The Year 1 and Year 4 students were able to connect and extend their knowledge outside of the general classroom, and develop their practical skills in all learning areas such as Art, Science, Physical Education and History and Geography.

The Year 1s immersed themselves in

the different practical hands-on activities. They enjoyed looking at the seasonal produce on the property and made healthy lemon balls from the fresh lemons they harvested from the lemon trees in the orchards. Students eagerly participated in a Scavenger Hunt around the property using their senses to find and collect items.

The highlight for the Year 4 experience was the Sunflower Analysis study. The Year 4 students demonstrated their artistic talents by creating masterpieces of sunflowers grown on the property. They did this by adding different shades of colours and implied texture to replicate Sunflowers by the artist Van Gogh.

It was a fantastic week to observe our Year 1 and 4 students engaging and embracing the learning opportunities at the Staughton Vale Farm. Students made positive connections beyond the classroom and created links with concepts taught at school which supported their deeper understanding of the environment in which they live.

Photography Competition Semester One 2023



Host Families

Bacchus Marsh Grammar has a long standing exchange with a sister school, Lycée Sainte-Marie Lyon, in France. After a three year pause due to Covid, we are pleased to announce that the exchange will resume this year. Bacchus Marsh Grammar will welcome a group of twenty French students, 12 girls and 8 boys, in 2023.

The group will be accompanied by two of their teachers; one of whom is very experienced with trips and has accompanied this trip on a number of previous occasions. We are looking for families who are willing to host a French student aged between 14 and 16 years during their stay here in Australia. Each host family will be provided with information about the student who they will host.

Our French friends will arrive at Melbourne airport on the evening of the 14 July 2023 and will depart for Sydney on the 2 August 2023. During their time here, our French guests will attend selected lessons at Bacchus Marsh Grammar with their host brother or sister, and will also be taking part in organised activities (some overnight) to areas of local interest such as the Ballarat Wildlife Park and the Great Ocean Road.

We are looking for families who are able to offer our guests an individual bedroom and to welcome these young people to be one of the family for the duration of the stay. Whilst guests within the families, there will be a clearly outlined code of conduct to which the students will need to adhere. The vast majority of our visitors are reasonably proficient in English but, as always, both Bacchus Marsh Grammar and the two accompanying teachers from Lyon will be on hand to ensure that the experience leaves positive memories for all! Our French guests will be part of your family and, as such, know that they will need to follow "house rules" both with their host families and whilst here at school.

The main objective of their stay is to focus upon speaking English with native speakers, to integrate into the Australian way of life and to be treated as part of the family. We have always found that both students and families gain an immense amount from this cultural visit, with some friendships continuing to last many years after the initial visit.

Please be aware that in the interests of child protection, we will require all members of the host families aged over 18 to be willing to apply for a Volunteer Working with Children Check. There is NO cost for this national check but it will require each person to make an online application and provide the school with sight of the card which will be issued. We will also need to ask questions about family composition, pets and dietary requirements etc.

In order to make this home stay the best for all, the teachers at Bacchus Marsh Grammar will try to link each student with a host brother or sister who is close in age and, where possible, share some similar interests.

Spotlight on Woodlea Year 3 Global Studies and Science

In Global Studies, students have explored natural, managed and constructed features. Students have focused on the world's natural wonders and specifically investigated the Northern Lights, Grand Canyon, Mount Everest and the



Galapagos Islands. They have enjoyed using their newfound knowledge and creativity to construct a visual display in our classroom depicting each of these wonders of the world.

During Science lessons, students have been investigating the needs of living things. A highlight has been students growing their own radish. They have enjoyed watching their plants grow in the classroom and have been engaged in the concept of living things through this process. The students are eagerly awaiting the arrival of a chrysalis during Week 8. They will have the opportunity to witness the metamorphic life cycle of a butterfly and understand how it goes through a drastic change to reach the next stage of its life.

This week, Year 1 students travelled to Staughton Vale for their day program. Throughout the day students had the opportunity to participate in a series of different activities to explore all things outdoors. These activities included landscape watercolour painting, five senses scavenger hunt, a living thing profile and healthy cooking. Students were



eager to taste their creations but not all enjoyed the taste or lemon flavour. When they returned to school, students were excited to share their experiences and write a retell highlighting their favourite parts of the day.

In English, students have enjoyed reading and learning about a series of Fables. They have focused on the moral of the fable along with the characters, setting and plot. Students have been exposed to new vocabulary words and engaged in a variety of activities to demonstrate their knowledge. When reading Dog In The Manger, students had the opportunity to put themselves in the story and become one of the characters. They demonstrated their understanding of their focus word personification by creating dialogue that the animals could have used within the fable. They also compared what animals do in real life and what they do in a fiction story. The moral of this fable was, 'You should be nice and share, especially when someone else needs something more than you do,' which aligns with our Bacchus Marsh Grammar Values.

Middle School News

Maddingley Year 6 Science Day at Staughton Vale

On a beautiful autumn day in Week 6, Year 6 Science students attended Staughton Vale where they participated in a range of activities for their unit of Biological Sciences.

The students rotated through a series of activities demonstrating classification by investigating the flora and fauna.

The activities included:

- Leaf Critters students took their trowels, colanders, buckets and magnified bug catchers and explored around the creatures' homes mulch and leaf litter and discovered some small macroinvertebrates living there. They identified some of them by carefully looking at their characteristics and used microscopes for more detailed viewing. These were compared to identification charts. The animals were returned safely home afterwards.
- *Dichotomous keys* students walked around the property and selected 7-8 different leaves. They used these to create a key by observation of the characteristics of each leaf.
- Ash Germination Landcare donated native seeds for our students to germinate, with the intention of having them planted at Staughton Vale. Students observed fire in the pit where ash was collected and they learnt how fire can be used in a controlled way for plants to grow. The cooled ash was used on the seeds for germination. Students prepared seeds with and without ash to take back to the classroom to investigate how ash affects germination of seeds. As students return to the classroom, they will continue to watch their seeds germinate and, in the future, they will be able to see them growing back at Staughton Vale.



The Carnival is action-packed, with tug-o-war, gumboot throwing, and a pet show amongst the many popular activities happening throughout the day. And of course, to honour Blackwood's gold-mining history, there is the chance to try your hand at gold-panning. A family-friendly event, there is loads of other fun stuff for kids too – the treasure hunt, novelty games and races, face-painting and more. With fabulous live music, market stalls, delicious eats and licenced bars, the Blackwood Woodchop & Easter Carnival truly offers something for everyone.

The event is organised by the Blackwood Progress Association with proceeds from ticket sales going to support numerous community groups.
