Character sought through Co-Curricular Enrichment

3/ Academic Achievement

Students who engage in co-curricular activities often experience better academic outcomes. It fosters the students' ability to think creatively, concentrate, collaborate effectively, manage their time and take responsibility for academic tasks. Additionally, involvement in co-curricular activities can ignite a student's passion for learning and foster a more positive attitude towards school, resulting in higher grades, educational aspirations and overall academic achievement.

4/ Self Esteem and Wellbeing

When your child experiences success outside of the classroom, it can significantly improve their self-confidence, self-esteem and wellbeing. Studies have found that students who participated in co-curricular activities have better mental health outcomes at school and feel a greater sense of belonging than those who don't participate.



Year 9/10 Sporting Club (Maddingley) Term 3

The Sporting Club has kicked off at BMG for our Year 9 & 10s with sessions in Rugby and Ultimate Frisbee being conducted over the last two weeks. The next sport to be added to the Club will be Quick Stix which is an alternative form of Lacrosse. The school has been fortunate in receiving a sporting grant to help increase physical activity and promote sporting opportunities to our Year 9/10 cohort. These sessions are conducted by coaches within the sporting organisation and will run for the remainder of term but be limited to 30 students per session. Elite Sport Applications Year 9 and 10

Thank you to all students/athletes who applied for the Elite Sporting Program for Years 9 and 10 in 2024. Students will now undertake their testing afternoon to gather data about their current fitness parameters.

Information regarding successful candidates will be released over the coming weeks after the review process has been completed by our panel of staff which consists of former Commonwealth Games, national level and high performance coaches and an independent review by the WestVic Academy of Sport Executive Officer and team.

Unfortunately, we cannot offer a place to all candidates. However, we encourage all athletes to continue to train hard and strive for success. As in previous years, we will review all applications and grade each one on the following criteria;

- 1. Level of competition in which the athlete has consistently been competing.
- 2. Quality of the athlete's coach's reference.
- 3. Performance of the athlete at the testing afternoons and benchmarks met.
- 4. Commitment to representing their House and the School in events (e.g. ICCES).
- 5. Approach to studies, attitude and results within Physical Education and Sport classes.
- 6. Behaviour and approach to studies within their academic subjects.
- 7. Meeting subject selection criteria as per the requirements of the Year 9/10 elective program.

The standard of applicants was extremely high once again with a large number of athletes achieving either National or State representation within their chosen sport.

Middle School Science Experiences at Staughton Vale: Chemical Science

In Term 3, our Middle School students from Maddingley headed to Staughton Vale for a range of activities that helped them learn more about Chemical Science.



Year 6 students learnt about Physical and Chemical Changes. They explored the process of making honeycomb and pancakes and used a solar oven to attempt to melt chocolate. Students collected lemons from the orchard and used the juice for invisible writing and to react the juice with sodium bicarbonate to make gas. Dirt from the market garden was used to attempt to construct a battery. Although not successful in producing a current, the activity

stimulated a lot of discussion about circuits and conductivity which is a valuable introduction to the concept of chemical to electrical change and circuits that they will study next term.

Reflections from 6A

- My name is Thomas Maat and going to Staughton Vale was really fun! We first learnt about making honeycomb in the kitchen using basic ingredients. When we combined the honey and flour with bicarbonate soda it changed colour, bubbled and grew in size. We then put it in the freezer and we could later eat it. This is a chemical change. We then did our pancake experiment which was just making pancakes. The science part of it is when we applied heat to the mixture and it soon became a solid, it was then edible. This is another example of a chemical change. We did a short experiment about chocolate melting into a liquid which was an example of a physical change. Then finally, we did an experiment with lemon juice.
- My name is Max Ambrogio. The recent Staughton Vale Year 6 trip was very educating and very helpful to us students at Bacchus Marsh Grammar. Students enjoyed a range of activities, including making pancakes which was a chemical change, melting chocolate which was a physical change, creating a dirt battery which was a chemical change, creating invisible ink with lemon juice and making a reaction with lemon juice and baking soda so that it rises.

Year 5 students visited Staughton Vale to learn about acids and bases in the natural world around us. They explored the property to collect two types of soil, dam water and lemons and tested the pH (acidity) of these substances. Students also assisted teachers to make a red cabbage indicator used to test their samples. The finale was a dry ice spectacular where students observed the process of sublimation (solid to gas).

Staff members were so pleased to hear students talk about how they enjoyed the day at the Staughton Vale campus and how the activities helped them to have a deeper understanding of their learning in Science. Some of their favourite activities were making pancakes and tasting them, and the Dry Ice Demonstration run by Mr Davie. Back in the classroom, students will complete further work in Chemical Sciences inspired by their day at Staughton Vale.


