

Supporting your young person through VCE exams

As the end of the year fast approaches, the Year 12 students, along with students studying a Unit 3/4 subject, are well into their preparation for final exams. Many students will be experiencing a broad range of emotions and often find this time of year particularly stressful; feeling overwhelmed by the pressure to achieve. It is important to remember that not all stress is bad, and a healthy level of stress can be motivating! If you notice that your young person is already feeling the pressure, you can support them in a number of ways. As a parent or carer, you can encourage your young person to sleep and eat well, have a quiet and clean study space, manage distractions, stay active and, most importantly, be there to listen as they ride the emotional wave.

Conveyance Allowance

Please note that Conveyance Allowance applications will be closing for the year on Friday 10th of November: after this date no further applications will be accepted for 2023.

Payments for semester two 2023 will be processed in February next year. Please send an email to conveyance@bmg.vic.edu.au if you need to update any of your details regarding payment of your Conveyance Allowance.

All current applications will be rolled over into 2024. You will not need to send in a new application unless your circumstances have changed (i.e., change in address, change in transport method).

The conveyance allowance is a contribution towards transport costs and is not intended to cover the full cost of transporting children to and from school.

The conveyance allowance may be available to students attending government or non-government schools and:

- travelling by public transport or by private car, motorbike, bicycle, or bus, and
- whose nearest school is not serviced by a free school bus provided under the School Bus Program

Eligibility Criteria:

- 1. Students must reside 4.8km or more from their nearest school/campus they attend.
- 2. Students must be of school age and reside in Victoria
- 3. Students must be enrolled in a school for 3 or more days per week.

If your decision to send your children to Bacchus Marsh Grammar was because you felt that it was the nearest appropriate school that both respected ecumenical values but did not require your child to participate in religious instruction or religious celebration; then you may (subject to other Conveyance Allowance rules) be eligible for the Conveyance Allowance.

If this statement applies to you and you would like to submit a Conveyance Allowance application, please complete the appropriate Conveyance Allowance Application Form (available from the school's website under the Community tab). Your application must include a signed supporting letter outlining the reasons above for your decision to send your child to Bacchus Marsh Grammar.

Please be aware that no allowance is payable if the journey to and from school could be made using a free bus service.
