CSEF (Camps, Sports and Excursion Fund)

The Camps Sports and Excursion Fund (CSEF) is provided by the Victorian Government to assist eligible families to cover the costs of school excursions, camps and sporting activities for the benefit of your child. The allowance will be paid to the school by the Education Department.

This is applicable to families who hold a valid means-tested concession card such as a Centrelink Pensioner Concession Card, a Health Care Card, or are a temporary foster parent.

To encourage families to make an application, the School will provide a rebate equivalent to the School Development Levy for those families who submit applications and which are approved by The Education Department. The CSEF application form can be downloaded below. The form outlines eligibility requirements and needs to be returned to the School by 17 June 2024. Parents must meet the eligibility requirements by Eligibility Date 29 January 2024 or 2nd CRN validation date (for failed CRNs only) 15 April 2024.

Parents that received the CSEF at Bacchus Marsh Grammar in 2023 do not need to complete an application form in 2024, providing there has been no change to their family circumstances.

Prep Update

We are so proud of how well the Maddingley Prep students have settled into the routine of being at school. The students have had a wonderful start and should be complimented for their manners and the positive behaviour they have been displaying. In English, the Preps have shown great enthusiasm whilst delving into nursery rhymes and fables. They have learnt the following graphemes and phonemes –m, s, f, p, a and t, and were super-excited when they learnt to read some words containing these phonemes. In Mathematics, Preps have engaged in hands-on activities designed to enhance and develop their understanding of numbers. We focused on counting sets up to ten, ordering numbers to ten, and the correct formation of numbers. We have really focused on how to be a good listener whilst sitting on the mat as well as learning and displaying the school values of Kindness, Respect and Confidence.

Science in the Junior School

Year 2 Science

This term, the Year 2 students have been exploring how human bodies function and their requirement for energy from food. We began with an adventure into the world of Winnie the Pooh and his grumbly belly which had a desire for honey to fuel his body on his explorations.

Our journey then followed along with a fictional character named Jason and his hiking trip with his Uncle Bryson. We learnt that even after Jason's healthy and filling breakfast, multiple snacks and plenty of water along the way, he still needed a substantial lunch to give his growing body the energy that it needed to complete the rest of the physically demanding hike.

The Year 2 students explored the journey of food in the Digestive System through the oesophagus, stomach, small intestine and large intestine, and experimented with a hands-on demonstration using a human chain to pass a tennis ball along the 'digestive tract' and a tennis ball in a stocking to mimic the muscular contractions called peristalsis, to push the food through the Digestive System. We have learnt that the nutrients from food make their way through the blood to the cells, tissues and organs to provide the fuel they need to help our bodies grow and repair, and also how wastes are removed from the body to maintain our health and functionality.

Our term concludes with a dive into what makes a balanced and healthy diet to ensure our bodies get the nutrients that we need to grow and repair our cells and make sure we have the energy we need to learn and move our bodies throughout the day.

We are looking forward to delving into Space next term as we learn about how we have days and nights!

Year 3 Science

The Maddingley Year 3 students have been learning about the importance of safe practices in a laboratory environment to ensure that we can all learn and experiment in a safe space. We then commenced our Biological Sciences topic of 'Life Cycles, Traits and Variations' to explore the different types and stages of life cycles of living things such as animals who give live birth, lay eggs and go through metamorphosis, and plants that produce flowers, seeds or spores to reproduce. The students completed multiple life cycles diagrams, labelling the various stages, drawing scientific diagrams of once-living resin samples, and explaining how all animals go through birth, growth, reproduction and death, and that all plants go through germination, growth, pollination/reproduction and death. Our students then completed their own research and life cycles of a chosen plant or animal and created a model using art and craft supplies. We then started exploring how plants and animals have physical traits and get these traits from their parents, as well as how siblings and individuals within a species may have similar traits but still look different from each other. Finally, we investigated how changes in our environments can affect how living things grow and change by putting our Grassheads to the test in environments with and without light and water, to see how their development changed. Next term, we are excited to be learning about how the Earth has changed over time through various crust-shaping processes such as natural disasters and erosion. Science rocks! Year 4 Science



This term, our Year 4 Biologists have been learning about the Structures and Functions of Living Things. This includes both plants and animals, and how they depend on each other and the environment to survive. They used microscopes and food colouring to explore the structure and function of the parts of a plant, specifically focusing on how water is transported, nutrients are absorbed and wastes are removed. Students learned that cells form tissues, tissues form organs and organs form organ systems. Students also explored the function of the nervous, skeletal, digestive, muscular and respiratory systems, and how they work together to create life!

They also investigated how animal senses interact with stimuli in our environments and how these interactions generate a response such as blinking to protect our eyes. Next term's focus is on our weather systems.

Visual Arts in Junior School

At Woodlea in Visual Arts, the Prep students began by exploring 'The Big Orange Splot' by Daniel Pinkwater, creating dream house illustrations and abstract selfportraits inspired by Pablo Picasso. They are currently working on 'All about me' artworks using colour mixing and textured paper, leading to self-portrait oil pastel creations.

The Year 1 students focused on colour mixing, self-portraits and watercolour backgrounds, drawing inspiration from Paul Klee and James Rizzi. They also explored warm and cool colours in rainbow lorikeet drawings and are now delving into collagraphs themed around flowers.

The Year 2 students started with oil pastel self-portraits, followed by the colour wheel and complementary colours exploration. They practised observational drawing with wooden figures and are now creating self-portrait collages.

The Year 3 students began with interpretations of 'Starry Night' by Vincent Van Gogh, exploring abstract landscapes, and soon they will utilise watercolours for winter silhouettes.

The Year 4 students embarked on their artistic journey with Keith Haring-inspired figures, then Uluru Mixed Media landscapes, and are presently exploring Ginger Riley Munduwalawala inspired landscapes.

These projects encourage exploration of various styles, techniques and cultural influences. We anticipate more exciting artworks in Term Two.

Mycoplasma Pneumoniae Infection

What is the issue?

Mycoplasma pneumoniae infection is caused by the bacterium Mycoplasma pneumoniae (M. pneumoniae). The number of confirmed cases of M. pneumoniae infection in Victoria has been increasing, particularly in children and adolescents. An increase in emergency department presentations and hospital admissions has also been reported. Similar increases have also been reported interstate.

Globally, there has been an increase in M. pneumoniae infections in many countries and regions, including the United Kingdom, Europe, China and North America. This typically occurs every 3-7 years as population immunity wanes.

Who is at risk?

Mycoplasma infections are most common in those aged 5 to 20 years but can occur at any age.

Symptoms and transmission

M. pneumoniae infection usually causes mild self-resolving respiratory illness, however, in some cases, it can cause severe pneumonia and rarely other atypical presentations. Symptoms include fever, sore throat, dry cough, headache and malaise which typically develop over 1-3 weeks. Cough and fatigue can persist for more than one month. People may also appear well as it is sometimes referred to as "walking pneumonia". Signs of atypical pneumonia on a chest x-ray may include a bilateral lower lobe reticulonodular pattern or patchy infiltrates.

M. pneumoniae is transmitted from person-to-person through respiratory droplets.

Preventing spread

Good hand hygiene and cough etiquette are important for preventing infection.
