Developing Character

This week, I had the privilege, along with Miss Fitzgerald and the Year 10 Pre-VCE Germany in the Twentieth Century class, of attending the Jewish Holocaust Museum in Elsternwick. The museum is dedicated to the memory of the six million Jews murdered by the Nazis and their collaborators between 1933 and 1945. The program allowed students to learn about the Holocaust from individual perspectives, connect with Melbourne-based survivors through their testimonies and interact with the recently, newly opened museum. The students were also fortunate to hear from Holocaust survivor Peter Gaspar who, at the completion of his talk, left the students with the following,

"You all have choices, and your choices define who you are to yourself and others."

The program additionally brought to light the character strengths displayed by Holocaust survivors as researched by Melbourne University. As our school continues to develop and research its own Character Education Program, I think it most poignant to reflect on these character strengths, learn the lessons that history holds and ask ourselves the question:

How can these character strengths influence the choices we make each day?

Kindness – Showing care to others



Fairness – Treating all people justly



Hope – Having a sense of optimism and perseverance in creating positive outcomes


The Spotlight on Teaching and Learning in the Junior School

Reading Foundations: Phonological and Phonemic awareness.

'Most children who will struggle with learning to read have underdeveloped phonemic awareness when they enter school'.

Ashby, J. et al. (2022)

Phonemic awareness is the most powerful predictor of future reading ability in young children. Phonological awareness and phonemic awareness are aural and oral skills that allow children to understand that speech is made up of words, and that words are made up of distinct sounds and sound patterns.



Phonological awareness refers to the ability to identify (hear or recognise) and manipulate (play with) the sounds in spoken language. This includes words, syllables, onsets and rimes, and the individual speech sounds in words (phonemes).

Phonemic awareness is a subset of phonological awareness that involves the specific skill of identifying and manipulating individual speech sounds within words (phonemes).

Phonological awareness and the more sophisticated sub-skill of phonemic awareness are essential for successful reading. If a child is struggling to learn **phonics**, the alphabetic code, or is having difficulties applying this knowledge to single word or text reading, this could be the result of poor phonological awareness. Strong phonemic awareness gives students an advantage in learning phonics because it makes it easier for students to perceive phonemes and map them to graphemes for reading and spelling.

Phonemes are not always easy to distinguish because we don't articulate them separately – they are buried in a constant stream of speech, or co-articulated (run together). Some phonemes are easily confused so learners, especially those with a diagnosed learning difficulty such as dyslexia should not be left to identify speech sounds in words unassisted. We need to explicitly teach phonemic awareness if children are to benefit from phonics instruction and experience success in reading.

Parents can support their children in developing strong phonological and phonemic awareness by practising these aural/oral skills regularly at home. Ideas for developing phonological and phonemic awareness will feature on the Junior School Teaching and Learning Tile which can be accessed via the Family Engagement page on Schoolbox for each year level. This week's bright idea focuses on the phonological awareness skill of rhyming. Look out for more 'bright ideas' in the coming weeks.

'Guardians of Staughton Vale' Erosion Monitoring Project Launch

This week, our Maddingley Year 8 Geography and Social Science students embarked on an exciting fieldwork project to identify various landforms around our Staughton Vale campus. Students collected data and reflected on the impact of human activity and environmental processes on these natural features.

As part of their studies, students explored different campus areas, noting how elements like paths, buildings, and recreational areas have shaped and continue to change the landscape. This initiative also marks the beginning of an exciting long-term project to monitor active erosion at Staughton Vale, with this group being the first to gather baseline data including a soil texture analysis of key spots at Grandma's Gully. Their observations and recordings will set the stage for future classes to track changes over time, fostering a deeper understanding of environmental processes and stewardship.

We are very proud of our student Geographers for playing a part in looking after our beautiful campus and thank all Staughton Vale staff for their high level of support and expertise.


Senior School News

Bus and Transport Updates

Parking

A reminder to parents it is recommended that parents pull off the road into a service road or designated car park (where possible) while picking up or dropping off their children at the bus stop.

We request that parents are mindful not to park their cars in the way of the bus and ensure that the bus has enough space to safely drive into and pull out of the stopping zone. Also, as our buses stop in a residential area, it is important that parents DO NOT park in or across a driveway, and always respect residential property.

Parents are reminded to be mindful of the turning area of the bus in residential streets. This may mean parents need to park their car a short distance from the stop and walk to the stop to drop off or collect their child as a courtesy to the driver and others.

Student Permission Cards

Students in Prep – Year 6 require a green permission tag on their bag if they are to disembark the bus to be picked up by someone other than their parent/guardian. Students in Grade 5 & 6 can disembark the bus on their own if they have a green permission tag on their bag for the driver to check. Student Afternoon Bus Arrangement & Permission Notices are available on Schoolbox under School Letters. Please return Student Afternoon Bus Arrangement & Permission Notices to bus@bmg.vic.edu.au. Calls on the day to advise that someone else will be collecting your child will not be accepted.

Student ID Cards

Students MUST use their Student ID card to tap on/off their private bus. Student ID cards are compulsory when boarding a private bus or attending all school excursions/camps etc and they must be carried at all times.

Students who board the bus repeatedly without their ID cards will receive a detention or further consequences. If a student has lost or misplaced their Student ID card they are to go to ICT to have a new card printed.

Rockbank Station Private Shuttle Bus Service to Woodlea Campus

Bacchus Marsh Grammar has a private Shuttle Service available for students and staff to utilise between Rockbank Station and the Woodlea Campus. 
