The Importance of Literature in Character Education.

Recently I had the pleasure of researching and writing a piece regarding the use of literature in character education. By definition of 'character education' encompasses any form of holistic moral education focusing on the systematic development of virtues as stable traits of character, with the aim of promoting human flourishing. Importantly, character is seen as educable, and our virtues are not fixed but can be developed through both explicit and implicit educational activities.

Historically, character education has been an important part of education, from the ancient Greeks to modern day curriculum. Storytelling and the use of narrative literature has played a significant role in not only education more widely, but in the teaching of character. The sharing of stories in the teaching of virtue and character occurs across many cultures and not only takes place in written form but also through dance, spoken word, song and ceremony. Storytelling engages our thinking as well as our emotions. It enables individuals to share their life experiences cultures, histories, religions and morals. Storytelling also enables the learning of "what to do" or "what not to do" by setting examples and sharing successes and failures and lessons learnt through experience. This allows the student to be aware of options that they may face in similar situations and thus provides them with the opportunity to analyse, think and consider the options open to them in making a decision. Stories instruct the mind by prompting personal identification and reflection. Good stories have universal appeal and resonate with the truth. In this way, storytelling helps us recognise the way we should behave, how we should treat each other and how flourishing, the "ultimate" aim of character education, may be achieved.



As parents, please take the opportunity to ask questions of the students regarding the text they are reading, dive a little deeper and unlock the character strengths and traits the book portrays. What is the book about, who are the main characters, does anyone in the book show values aligned to our schools' values, who is kind in the book, who shows respect and how? These types of questions will reinforce the value of literature in developing character and help students think about what is right and how we should behave. For example, from Sandi Toksvig's award winning novel, "Hitlers Canary" which highlights the virtues of integrity, respect, compassion and empathy.

"Are there many Jewish Danes?' I asked my father that evening. 'There are large Danes, small Danes, lazy Danes, hardworking Danes, even Great Danes' Papa smiled at his own joke – 'but we are all Danish. That's all. Just Danish.'

Maddingley Junior School Art

During Term 3, students at the Maddingley campus have continued to explore the Elements of Art, with a greater focus on form and texture through a variety of different sculpture and construction activities. They have experimented with a variety of materials to create some impressive three-dimensional works of art.

In Prep, students enjoyed learning about artist Claude Monet and exploring his various artworks. They have been introduced to sculpture techniques such as pinch, pull and coil making by creating snails. They were then able to experiment with a range of construction techniques when creating a three-dimensional version of Monet's Bridge.

The Year 1s have enjoyed experimenting with air dry clay, where they demonstrated their knowledge of techniques such as pinch, pull and coil making to create a mouse pinch pot.

Year 2 students have been introduced to clay and the process that happens when the clay is fired in the kiln. They created their own fish pinch pot sculpture,

demonstrating different ways of

manipulating and adhering clay such as pinch, pull and scratch and attach.

In Year 3, students have created a clay castle. They have demonstrated how to roll a slab, make a coil and have used various tools to add texture to their sculptures.

The Year 4 students linked their prior knowledge of Ancient Chinese history to create terracotta warriors. They were able to further develop their skills of adhering the terracotta using the scratch and attach method to ensure all the parts were thoroughly secured. They also experimented with adding texture to their sculptures.



A reminder to parents that, as per the 2024 Business Notice (6.1.2), parents/guardians must provide at least one term's notice in writing to the Principal before they withdraw students from the School. If a student is not returning for Term 1 2025, parents/guardians must advise the Principal, in writing, prior to the commencement of Term 4 2024. Note for students enrolled in Year 6 for Year 7 2025, the notice period required is a minimum of two terms. [Refer Conditions of Enrolment].

Failure to provide the appropriate notification will result in the parents/guardians being billed an Administrative Fee, which will be \$750 for a Primary School student and \$1,000 for a Secondary School student. [Refer <u>Conditions of Enrolment</u>].



NUT FREE ZONE! - This means strictly NO Peanut Butter or Nutella in sandwiches please; this could be potentially life threatening to a child who suffers from anaphylaxis.
